Bygdøy museum island in Oslo offer tourists world-class cultural experiences, easily accessible by boat, bus and bicycle from central Oslo. A new ferry route connects easily from and to the MUNCH pier. This summer you also have the last opportunity to experience the Viking ships at Bygdøy, before the museum closes for rebuilding on October 1, and opens as new world attraction in 2025/2026.

Two new modern buildings opened on Norway's popular Norwegian Scenic Routes. On one of these routes you will travel along Sognefjellet, where the new Oscarshaug viewpoint and picnic area opened July 1st. On the Lofoten Norwegian Scenic Route, a new modern service building at Moskenes ferry quay with fantastic view (without photo) opened already June 11th. God tur!
